

IVF National Voter Survey

1,200 Registered Voters Nationally April 11-14, 2025

Methodology

- 1,200 registered voters were surveyed nationally from April 11-14, 2025.
- Interviews were stratified into proportionate units based on national registered voter statistics.
- 25% of respondents were surveyed on a landline phone, 35% were surveyed on a cell phone, and 40% using text-to-online.
- Margin of sampling error for 1,200 likely voters is ±2.83%.



Key Take-Aways (1)

- Political environment is evenly divided, despite Dems being heavily underwater.
 - Voters are slightly pessimistic, with 53% saying the USA is headed in the wrong direction.
 - Generic ballot is Dem 45%, GOP 44% a statistical dead heat.
 - President Trump's image (-3) and approval rating (-4) are marginally negative.
 - Most voters disapprove of the job Republicans in Congress are doing (-9), but Democrats are much worse off at -37.
- Health insurance companies are not well-liked, with a 36/52 negative image.
- From the get-go, voters have an extremely positive view of IVF.
 - Nearly two-thirds (65%) have a favorable opinion of IVF, while just 7% are unfavorable. The remaining 28% have no opinion or have never heard of IVF.
 - When IVF is explained, 85% are in favor of IVF, while just 7% are opposed.
 - IVF is very popular across the political and religious spectrum. There is no base of opposition, with even Catholics, Evangelicals, and Pro-Lifers strongly in support of IVF.
- Only a third of voters are aware of recent IVF news.
 - Among those who have seen, read, or heard something, the top recall is that some states are banning IVF.



Key Take-Aways (2)

- Strong belief that health insurance should be required to cover IVF services.
 - Most are currently unsure if health insurance covers IVF, while the remaining are more inclined to think it does not cover IVF (29%) than think it does (19%).
 - An overwhelming 82% believe health insurance should cover IVF, while only 10% are opposed.
 - More specifically, 74% are in favor of a law that would require health insurance in every state to cover IVF, while only 17% are opposed.
 - This includes Evangelicals (75% favor/15% oppose), Catholics (73% favor/20% oppose), and Pro-Lifers (67% favor/25% oppose).
 - Top reasons for support are that everyone has a right to have a family (42%) and infertility is a medical issue, so health insurance should cover it (30%).
 - At 33%, rising health insurance costs is the top reason for opposition.
 - A Senator or Rep. who votes for a bill that requires IVF coverage would see a positive impact on their vote: 48% more likely, 9% less likely, 40% no impact. Impact is positive with all parties:
 - Republicans: 36% more likely, 13% less likely, 49% no impact
 - Independents: 48% more likely, 10% less likely, 40% no impact
 - Democrats: 61% more likely, 5% less likely, 31% no impact



BOTTOM LINE

IVF is incredibly popular across the political, religious, and social spectrum. Voters of all political stripes believe health insurance should cover IVF and support a bill that would require them to do so.






Political Environment

Mood of the Country

- A slight majority say the country is headed in the wrong direction, 53% 44%.
- Democrats are more pessimistic than Republicans are optimistic, while Indies say wrong direction by a 19-point margin.






Q3. Would you say that things in the country are going in (ROTATE) the right direction or the wrong direction.

Generic Congressional Ballot


- The generic ballot is statistically split down the middle, with Democrats getting 45% and Republicans 44%.
- Independents break for the generic Dem by a 9-point margin, 43% 34%.
- Pro-choicers, atheists, and non-Evangelicals drive the Democratic vote.





Donald Trump Image & Job Approval


- President Trump is marginally underwater on both his image (-3) and approval rating (-4).
- Independents view him negatively and disapprove by double-digit margins.
- The President's positives are built on support from Christians of all stripes.





Congressional GOP and Democrats Job Approval

- Both Republicans and Democrats in Congress are underwater, though Dems are in a much worse position.
- Indies disapprove of Dems more than the GOP by 20 net points, and Dems themselves barely approve of Dems in Congress.





Health Insurance Companies Image

- Voters do not like health insurance companies, with only 36% viewing them favorably and 52% unfavorably.
- They are especially unpopular with Independents (-35). GOP voters are marginally positive (+4).
- Atheists and pro-choicers drive the negative opinions of health insurance companies.

Abortion Opinion

- A bare majority (50%) believe abortion should be legal, including 29% who think there should be no restrictions.
- Independents are slightly more pro-choice than the average voter.
- Unsurprisingly, religious voters are significantly more likely to be pro-life.






IVF

IVF Image

- IVF is very popular, with 65% having a favorable opinion of it and only 7% an unfavorable one.
- Republicans are marginally less positive about IVF, though still view it favorably by a more than 5-to-1 margin.
- Atheists and pro-choicers are especially favorable about IVF.



IVF Favor/Oppose

- When IVF is described, a massive 85% say they are in favor of IVF, including 62% who strongly favor the process. Only 7% oppose IVF.
- Even groups that are not as supportive, like Republicans and GOP voters, still are in favor of IVF by huge margins of more than 60-points.





IVF News Awareness

- Only about 1-in-3 have recently seen, read, or heard something about IVF.
- Groups most supportive of IVF are the most likely to have SRH about it, though still less than half are aware.


- The top specific things voters have s/r/h about IVF is that some states are banning it (23%), that Trump is in favor of it (11%), insurance coverage (10%), and that Republicans are not in favor of it (9%).
- More than 30% of aware Dems, pro-choicers, and Atheists have SRH something about states banning IVF.

IVF Insurance Coverage Awareness

- More voters believe insurance does NOT cover IVF (29%) than does (19%), but a 52% majority are unsure.
- Every key political and religious group is more likely to say insurance does not cover IVF than does.






Insurance Plans Cover IVF

Voters are

overwhelmingly in favor of health insurance plans covering IVF, 82% - 10%.

 Even among the few voters with an unfavorable view of IVF are split on whether insurance plans should cover IVF.

Require IVF Insurance Coverage

- Three in four voters are in favor of a law requiring health insurance plans in all 50 states to cover IVF.
- Democrats are the most supportive and the Republicans are least so, but the GOP is still in favor by a wide 37-point margin.
- Similarly, pro-lifers are in favor of a law requiring IVF coverage by a wide 42-point margin.

- Rising healthcare costs, the government shouldn't be involved, and children being elective are why people oppose.



Required IVF Insurance Coverage Vote Impact

- A Representative/Senator that vote for an IVF requirement law would cause 48% to be more likely to vote for them and just 9% to be less likely.
- The impact is a clear net positive across the political and religious spectrum.




